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
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Introduction

Chapter 1 - Stick to a Schedule:

Heroes: A groom labeled all his groomsmen as super heroes. Each groomsman was handed a different superhero's outfit as they entered the room to be announced - Captain America, The Hulk, Iron Man, etc. The coolest part was the bios for each groomsman. The groom had me (the DJ) read a brief explanation of how each superhero fit the person - - the

Chapter 3 - Cut the Formalities:

There are some great wedding traditions, but this does not mean that you have to do each one of them. Are there only two single girls attending as guests? You should probably cut the bouquet toss. The Father/Daughter & Mother/Son dance doesn't need to last 5 minutes each. It's usually a little awkward—so once the pictures are snapped - have the DJ gently fade out the music.



Chapter 4 - Signature Cocktails:

Chapter 5 - Fewer Toasts:

Head off long winded and embarrassing toasts. At the actual reception, keep the toasts to a minimum, short and sweet like a graceful blessing before the meal or quick welcome by the

Chapter 6 - Feed People:
